Emerging Al Tools Help Address Largest Pain Points Among Healthcare Workers

In honor of Certified Nurses Day, Carta Healthcare released a survey about the pain points keeping healthcare professionals up at night. Carta Healthcare's February 2024 survey of 500 U.S. healthcare workers found that the biggest threats to the healthcare industry are the nursing shortage, high care costs, and the lack of personnel to care for the aging population. These results align with a consumer survey of October 2022, where respondents agreed that high costs and lack of personnel were among the top concerns.




